### WHAT WE DO

Dartnership for the Future (PFF) is now a four-year program that Pprovides critical life skills and education through internship placements and college preparation training. Our mission is to provide high-potential students from challenging circumstances in metro-Richmond area schools with the abilities and experiences necessary to attain college degrees.

PFF works with area high school counselors to identify candidates. Only onethird of the students who apply to the program qualify for the limited number of spaces. Following admission, students participate in SAT prep courses along with classes designed to prepare them for the challenges of college. These range from time management to developing critical thinking abilities.

Students also participate in paid internships that help in developing new skills, gaining experiences and discovering new opportunities. Additionally, PFF staff and mentors guide students through the complex process of college preparation. This includes preparing applications and entrance essays, as well as applying for financial aid, scholarships and grants. In 2012, PFF provided services to 124 students with more than 70 companies participating in the Partnership. Ninety-nine percent of students who complete the program matriculate to post-secondary educational programs
